

Gunton Wood

Our workers have spent many hours felling tall conifer trees at Pleasurewood Hills. The resultant logs are being used for path edging. Old decaying path edging has been removed to a new habitat in Moore's Lane. The ladies have been clearing debris from the ditch - a job which always takes several Thursday morning sessions. The bottom end of the ditch near PwH often gets blocked - more work for the mudlarks!

Corn cockle sown and yellow rattle have been planted in the B&B area and cowslips, grown from seed, put into Moore's Lane. The annual Spanish bluebell cull has taken place and daffodils dead headed. Our tree nursery has had a make over and the footpath inside was cleaned and re-laid. Hawthorn, hazel and blackthorn were dug in along the school fence replacing whips which didn't withstand the drought.



Donations received have enabled us to buy new tools including shears, loppers, secateurs, a pole saw and brush cutter. The latter will be a great help when our wildflower meadow is cut and raked in the autumn. Adnams donated towards the purchase of a secondhand tractor, the old one, having been over-worked, is now ready for the knacker's yard. Two sisters visited us at coffee break one Thursday and gave us a cheque for £185 in memory of their parents who frequently enjoyed walking through the wood.

Foxburrow Wood

Work in Foxburrow has involved tackling Himalayan Balsam which looks pretty when in flower but is an invasive species and difficult to eradicate. Muddy boardwalks have been swept clean, some of the ditch has been attacked and damaged fence along the A47 has been repaired. Various tasks outstanding include digging up brambles to enable the bluebells to give a good show next year. Sadly during the half-term break the Suffolk Wildlife Trust notice board was torn down.

Nature Notes A Butterfly Bonanza!

Just occasionally you can be lucky enough to witness an event in the natural world that you will never forget. This happened to us just a few days ago when we were standing in our front garden. In recent years our small lawn has been taken over in increasing

numbers by a tiny, pretty pale blue flower which we think is the Blue Star Creeper (Isotoma fluviatilis). Always a magnet for bees, we were astonished to find that it was covered by a bevy of beautiful **Painted Ladies** (**Vanessa cardui**). We counted more than 30 in a patch less than 2 metres across. They were a little camera shy so it was not possible to catch the crowd but they persisted all day in hoovering up the sweet nectar from the stars. The Painted Lady is known for spectacular migration patterns with vast numbers capable of flying 2000 miles at heights that make them invisible from the ground. These would have come from Southern Europe or North Africa. They will produce their first brood in August and will not survive a cold UK Winter. But fortunately, more will arrive next year.
