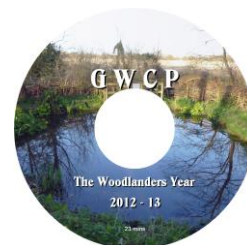

Annual General Meeting, 20th March 2013

A near capacity crowd of 69 members gathered in the main hall of Gunton Primary School for our 16th AGM which, this year, followed a slightly different format. Instead of having a Guest Speaker, Barry showed a film illustrating some of the activities of the Group over the past 12 months. As well as enabling him to cut down the length of his Chairman's Report (hooray!) this also meant that the meeting could close well before the 10 pm deadline without the usual last minute rush. The main event of the evening was to confirm the change in leadership of GWCP. Barry asked to stand down as Chair after 15 years and David Briggs was proposed as the new Chairman. After explaining that the new Gunton Memorial Wood Project would require more of his time Barry said he would still like to continue his links with GWCP in the position of Secretary. Other changes to the Committee included Ray Adcock, who had asked to step down, the inclusion of Janet Field as Committee Member and John Dickerson as Website Manager. All the changes were put to the vote and carried unanimously. Mr Frank Devereux then spoke of the early days of GWCP, when as Chairman of WDC he planted our very first tree in 1998. He presented Barry with a very handsome "Skeleton Clock", mounted in an elegant maple wood surround turned by David Ritchie, while Val was given a beautiful bouquet as recognition of her support

during the past 15 years.

A review of the past year showed that the Group was in a healthy position financially with total cash assets of £6500, we enjoyed social outings to Floriade, Beth Chatto, Long Melford and Snape and had very successful woodland parties to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee and the Teddy Bear's Picnic. For the future, several woodland improvement projects were proposed which would keep our work party volunteers fully occupied.

Harry Hill, representing Gunton St Peter's PCC, gave a progress review of the Memorial Wood Project, and Matt Gooch of Suffolk Wildlife Trust talked about plans for extensive restoration work at Gunton Warren and Gunton Denes which should be getting underway this year.

In closing the meeting our new Chairman David Briggs thanked everyone for their continuing support and enthusiasm for our very successful community group.

The state of the main footpath has been steadily worsening over the years, So after much deliberation and some false starts, we finally bit the bullet. Gratefully accepting the offer of a mini-digger from local firm JK Munnings, it didn't take Gordon very long to scrape off the thick accumulation of rotting wood chips to leave a firm, narrower, more user-friendly path. It is, of course, work in progress but after we have planted some new trees and shrubs along the sides we

Incidentally, water levels in the Top Pond are also at their historic high. Operations on its bur-weed problem have been put on hold until after the newt breeding season.



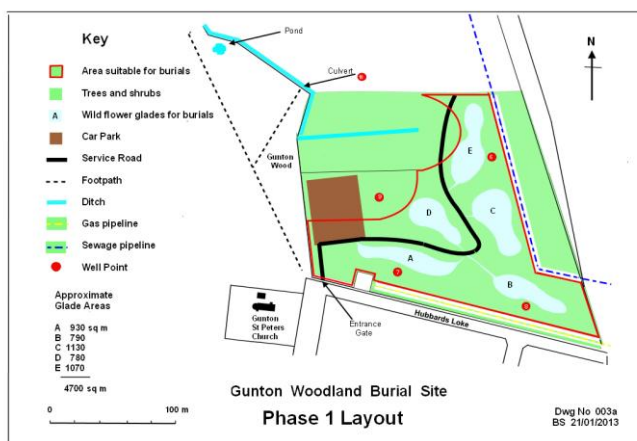
A ménage à trois?

Gunton Church Memorial Wood

On 3rd April 2013 the combined efforts of Gunton St Peters PCC and GWCP were finally rewarded when the Council granted Planning Permission for Phase 1 of the project. This followed the SCC Archaeological Service's acceptance of results of the "dig" carried out in November when GWCP member Gordon Spall operated a mini-digger to excavate 130m of trenches, 2m wide, distributed across the 5 proposed burial glades. Just two postholes were exposed neither of which indicated the former presence of any kind of structure or building. Moreover searches in the spoil heaps revealed a general lack of cultural material right across the site.

This clears the way to proceed with the execution of this important project. The first step is to gain occupancy of the land and so, in accordance with the Tenancy Agreement, the Farmer will receive 12 months' notice in October which should make it possible to start tree planting by the end of 2014.

There is plenty to do before then. Hopefully, grant funding will be available to help with the creation of new woodlands but much of this is bound up with EU legislation which is now under review.



The species and sources of the initial planting scheme, comprising nearly 6000 trees, will be chosen with care, after consulting with all the appropriate authorities, while planting operations will be planned so that as many members of the community as possible will be given an opportunity to take part.

If all goes according to plan, it is hoped that burials and interment of ashes could commence by the year 2016. As the woodland matures, it will take on the peaceful environment of a nature reserve open to the public for recreational use.

On 10th May we were told by the Big Lottery Fund that we had been awarded a grant of £1539 for the provision of further boardwalks in Foxburrow Wood and also to extend the fencing on the Western Perimeter along the A12. These improvements will be particularly welcome in the Winter when parts of the main footpath become impassable due to thick mud. At the same time gaps in the boundary hedgerow need to be closed with new fence rails. The work will be started this Summer.

David Wright 1939 – 2013

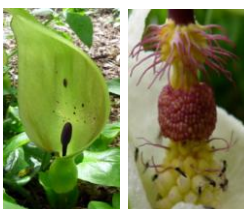

Nature Notes

Arum maculatum Lords and Ladies



Gunton Wood is full of these fascinating but very poisonous plants, also known as Devils & Angels, Cows & Bulls, Naked Boys, Cuckoo-Pint etc. Clustered in the base of the purple spadix are the cream female globular flowers, destined to become red berries, with red male flowers above. On top is a ring of hairs which trap flies attracted by the faecal odour. They get dusted with pollen and eventually escape when the spathe drops off enabling them to pollinate other plants.
